In the course of my duties as President, I recently had an opportunity to meet two delightful young ladies from one of our local universities. They were so bright and enthusiastic and surefooted about their futures that I couldn't help but be impressed.

In the course of that meeting however, I was disappointed to learn that they did not know who Lilly Ledbetter is. As we all know, it is in good part because of Lilly Ledbetter's fight for paycheck equity that these young ladies can be so positive about their own futures. Knowing our history is critical to women and girls -- and society -because historical figures inspire us to achieve our full potential and empower us as individuals to know what is possible.

March is National Women's History Month (NWHM) and this experience underscored for me the true value of having NWHM. When brave and iconic women are ignored in our history books, their acts of personal courage cease to exist for posterity. We may continue to enjoy the results of their actions. We vote because of the courage of the suffragettes: we can choose how many children to have because of the persistence of Margaret Sanger; we raise daughters who expect to be treated equally in the workplace because of people like Lilly Ledbetter. Without knowledge of the women who changed history for us, we are denied the inspiration and personal empowerment that learning their history promises us.

NWHM puts the spotlight on a void in the history that we learn in our traditional education, a void that exacerbates the limits we set for ourselves when we make our life choices. I believe that those limits are set both consciously and subconsciously and are defined by our life experiences and what we know about the world around us, both past and present.

I would like to start the month of March with a salute to Marion Talbot and Ellen Richards and the other 15 alumnae representing eight colleges who met in Boston in 1881 to discuss the needs of collegeeducated women. Here I am today, more than 130 years later, meeting with young college women to "discuss the needs of collegeeducated women." This is why knowing our herstory is so important. Knowing where we came from helps us self-determine where we are going. Herstory is Empowering. Join me in celebrating National Women's History Month. Start by going to hear Lilly Ledbetter speak at the South Bay Women's Conference on March 8 at SJSU.



Women's History Month Celebrating Women of Character, Courage & Commitment Jacqui Gustaferro and <u>Gloria Leonard</u>, Public Policy Committee

"Celebrating Women of Character, Courage & Commitment" is the 2014 theme of the National Women's History Project. In 1980, The NWHP was joined by hundreds of organizations and individuals when it spearheaded the movement for March to be declared as National Women's History Month. The 2014 theme honors the extraordinary and often unrecognized determination and tenacity of women. Women demonstrate their character, courage and commitment as mothers, educators, institution builders, business, labor, political and community leaders and CEOs.

The San Jose Branch stands on the shoulders of those who have gone before us in advancing the mission of AAUW. Is our advocacy effective? A recent inspiring communication from AAUW Public Policy Advisor Lisa Maatz stated that while our Congress isn't doing much these days, AAUW members advocating across the states are effective and successful. For example, AAUW spearheaded legislation that advanced paycheck fairness in New Jersey and Louisiana. AAUW Government Relations Manager Anne Hedgepeth discussed AAUW's commitment to preventing campus sexual assault on NPR (Kansas City Public Media).

In her last public speech, Susan B. Anthony honored the women she had worked with during her life for what she called "simple justice." She ended her speech with a belief that when people of good heart and purpose work together – "Failure is impossible." All members are welcome to attend the Public Policy Committee meetings (see Bonfire Calendar) as we continue to work for "simple justice."

## Headquarters has a Defibrillator (AED)

You have probably seen AED boxes at airports and other public places. But do you know what the AED is or when it should be used? An automated external defibrillator (AED) is a portable device that checks the heart rhythm. If needed, it can send an electric shock to the heart to try to restore a normal rhythm. AEDs are used to treat sudden cardiac arrest when the heart suddenly and unexpectedly stops beating. This usually causes death if not treated within minutes. In fact, each minute leads to a 10 percent reduction in survival.

The AED is easy to use. It has instructions and gives you voice prompts to let you know if and when you should send a shock to the heart. Learning how to use an AED and taking a CPR course are helpful. However, if trained personnel aren't available, untrained people also can use an AED to help save someone's life.

Thanks to Pat Diamond and support from the Board, the building committee recently purchased an AED for Headquarters. It is in a white box on the wall as you enter from the back door. It is ready to use. If you see a person suddenly collapse and pass out, or if you find a person already unconscious, you may need to use the AED. Phone 911, then retrieve the AED, pull the tab and follow the audio instructions. The AED will tell you what to do. AAUW members Kathy Myers, Dorothy Wilson and Linda Guyer (all RNs) are available to come to any interest group that meets at HQ to orient your group to the AED. Contact: Linda Guyer 408-316-6094.

If you would like to take a CPR course, Sports Basement in Campbell has a class twice a month on Sundays from 4-7 pm. This is an extensive three hour class. Register online at the Sports Basement website. This course is free.

A one-hour CPR class presenting the new recommendations for "Hands Only CPR" will be given at Headquarters on Thursday, March 13 at 2 pm. Kathy Myers, Dorothy Wilson and Linda Guyer will explain "hands only" and you will be able to practice on a mannequin. Class size limited to 15. #### Local Scholarship Applications Available Grace O'Leary, Local Scholarship

Applications for 2014 Local Scholarship awards are available as of March 1 on our Branch website, www.aauwsanjose.org, or at www.Fastweb.com. AAUW San Jose scholarships are awarded annually to women whose permanent home address is in Campbell, Milpitas, San Jose or Santa Clara; who have completed two full years at an accredited college or university; who have a GPA of 3.0 or higher; and who are enrolled in a four-year institution as an undergraduate.

Grants are based on significance of educational goals, scholastic achievements, merits of the application and an interview with members of the Local Scholarship Committee. The number and dollar amounts of the scholarships awarded each year depend on the funds available. This year we will be awarding \$30,000 in scholarships!

The Title IX struggle continues... Laura Manthey, Title IX/Sports Equity

I was shocked to read that lawmakers in Washington, D.C. recently "appear poised to pass legislation meant to address large and enduring discrepancies between boys' and girls' sports opportunities in the city's public schools." D.C is currently one of the worst offenders of Title IX. As you know, Title IX is more than 40 years old. Isn't it about time that ALL schools are in compliance?

Oddly, the day after I saw that piece I read an article about a study done by American University, a D.C. institution, in which 2,100 college students were surveyed. The survey showed that young women are far less likely to consider an elective office as a desirable profession. However, the study found that running for office had crossed the minds of 44% of women who had played sports and only 35% of women who had not. If we women want to have a say in the way our country is run, we should demand Title IX compliance and encourage our girls to participate in sport. It's about time!
