- Documents related to the Branch's 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary reunion lunch and program held at the Ste. Claire Hotel. I think we should be getting a significant discount by now, don't you?

I am making light of this work only because it is too easy to see it simply as drudgery - unless you are that rare individual who enjoys sorting and organizing. I predict this committee will have a lot of fun, because they will find and rescue Branch treasures and have the pleasure of sharing their discoveries with us. #### **Public Policy**

### Reauthorizing the ESEA - Congress Holds Hearing

What is the role of the federal government in education in the U.S? Congressional hearings on education policy and the reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act are being held and AAUW is weighing in. AAUW supports an updated education policy. Most importantly, we need Congress to do this update right by prioritizing solutions that will strengthen public schools nationwide, promote civil rights, and help close the achievement gap.

AAUW supports an education bill that:

Spends public funds on public education only - not private school vouchers or "portability" schemes that would pave the way for vouchers in the future:

Holds schools accountable for demonstrating that they are meeting educational goals;

Requires annual, statewide assessments that measure each student's progress toward meeting the state's college and careerready standards;

Requires schools to collect and break down data on students' performance by subgroups so they can identify and close achievement gaps; and

Reauthorizes and fully funds the Women's Educational Equity Act to provide resources to fully implement Title IX.

There are reports from AAUW that the new legislation might not look like what is outlined above. Watch for Action Alerts from AAUW Public Policy that we can send to urge our senators to stand strong on these educational principles.

#### Title IX/Sports Equity

Title IX requires equity in public school athletics. It also clearly prohibits retaliation. Kim Turner the Legal Aid Society-**Employment Law Center states** that in "our Title IX work with Fair Play for Girls in Sports, we often find that female students are subject to retaliation ... when girls or advocates raise issues of gender inequality in athletics." Recently, members of the U.S. women's soccer team, along with more than 60 female international soccer players, dropped their lawsuit against FIFA (the international soccer organization) which alleged discrimination at the Women's World Cup in Canada. Female teams are expected to play on inferior artificial turfs while men always play on natural grass. Players feared reprisal, stating that their places on teams were threatened and that the awarding of future World Cup games was in jeopardy. After 43 years of Title IX we still have a long way to go!

# Gifts For Teens What the Numbers Mean Jan Giroux

In recent BONFIRE articles, Gifts For Teens has announced our successful 2014 goal of filling and distributing a total of 1,380 holiday gift bags to needy Bay Area teens. But there's more to it than just the final number. Of the 1,380 bags, distribution went to the following agencies: 943 to Sacred Heart Community Services. 137 of the 943 being special gift bags, 292 to Bill Wilson

Sacred Heart Community Services, 137 of the 943 being special gift bags, 292 to Bill Wilson Center, 90 to Unity Care, 37 to Home First, 15 to Advent Group and 3 to extra teens.

Our total cash donor contribution was \$62,513, with \$26,855 from individuals, \$23, 623 from Grants/Company Match and fundraisers with \$12,035 as carry over from 2013. The number of people involved during 2014 was 625; this included 265 donors, 328 community volunteers and 32 knitters/bow makers. The numerous students and families from five schools that participated in school fundraising or clothing drives were in addition to this total.

Ninety-eight and a half percent of all donated funds are used to directly benefit the teenagers. As a measure of Gifts For Teens fiscal efficiency, for every \$35.00 spent, we delivered \$168.00 worth of bag contents. But the true value of this Community Action Project is not in the numbers, but in the stories you hear from the agencies about the grateful teens and their families who are recipients of the bags. And that value is priceless.

Japanese Traditional Performing Arts in the World War II Internment Camps
