January is **Adult Role Model Month**. Come and learn simple actions all of us can take to make Silicon Valley a better place for young people to thrive and grow. Our guest speakers are Linda Silvius of Project Cornerstone and Robin Jones, Principal of Noddin Elementary School.

Project Cornerstone has been collecting valuable information about students in Silicon Valley for several years and has provided programs to address identified needs of our students in our community. A 2010 survey measured developmental assets, which are positive values, skills, relationships and experiences that help young people grow up to be healthy, caring and responsible.

The more assets that young people have, the more likely they are to thrive. And the fewer assets that young people have, the more likely they are to get involved with negative or risky behaviors like violence, trouble in school, drug and alcohol use. One alarming result of the survey shows that almost half of elementary school students don't have adult role models.

AAUW Twitter Campaign Creates To-Do List

AAUW hosted a post-election Twitter Campaign to gather recommendations for what President Obama and Congress should do on their first days of the new term. Dozens of Twitter users answered, and their priorities make for an ambitious to-do list.

Some of the topics included in Twitter users' requests were pay equity, infrastructure spending, nominating women to cabinet and agency positions and to the bench, reauthorizing the Violence Against Women Act, access to Plan B, Title IX compliance, filibuster reform, climate change, immigration reform, reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, unemployment benefits, solar panels on the White House, and science, technology, engineering, and mathematics education.

AAUW members will not let their voices be silent now that we've voted. We are committed to holding elected officials accountable in Washington and Sacramento. Stanford University: Tech Trek 2013 Summer Camp Destination

"Tech Trek is a math/science camp designed to develop interest, excitement and self-confidence in young women who will enter eighth grade in the fall. It features hands-on activities in math, science and related fields. All sleeping, eating, instructional and recreational facilities are located on a university campus where camps are held." (www.aauw-techtrek.org) Our Branch will be sending six girls to the Stanford summer camp. Middle schools selected by our Branch coordinators have been contacted to ensure a smooth selection process. To be considered, each middle school nominee will have to complete an application form and write an essay on the topic: "Describe one form of renewable energy and how it will improve your community's quality of life". There will also be a face-to-face interview.

The cost for each girl is \$950 this year and we must constantly replenish our funds for future camps. One objective was to light up their buildings with the lowest possible amount of money. They discovered that each solar cell cost money, and found ways of making the most use out of one solar cell. The girls also had the opportunity to visit the other exhibits displaying the power of other forms of energy.

Next class: February 7, Thursday, A Morning with Veterinarians. The girls will read X-rays, learn animal anatomy and diseases, and see how a veterinarian performs a dog physical examination and "preps" for surgery. Volunteers are welcome.

FSH is the only shelter in Santa Clara County that serves single and two-parent families. Homeless families can stay 90 days in a clean, safe environment while finding employment and permanent housing. In January NHN will have two projects involving FSH. The first is our ongoing Cleaning Kit project which involves cleaning kits complete with mop, broom and assorted household cleaning products packed into a large laundry basket and given to families moving into their new permanent housing. These supplies help make the new housing feel like home! Our second project is a beef stew dinner prepared and served for all the residents at FSH on Friday, January 25. Several members of NHN cook up large batches of beef stew which are deliciously mixed together for a wonderful meal. Noodles, salad, rolls and dessert complete the menu. Great Decisions Groups Invite New Members


