AAUW Funds Awards Community Partner

San Jose Branch was gratified to hear that AAUW Funds awarded a 2013 Community Action Grant of \$7000 to the local agency Next Door Solutions to Domestic Violence. The Branch has been supporting Next Door for years with volunteer hours and donations (particularly the members of Neighbors Helping Neighbors) and raising awareness in our community about domestic violence. San Jose Branch leaders were contacted for a letter of support to go with the award application. The application was for funding to offer Next Door clients a "Self Sufficiency Program." Next Door advocates help domestic violence survivors understand their options, and through the Self Sufficiency program, help them prepare for the job market, find suitable educational opportunities, and to take steps that help them become independent and safe. We look forward to continuing to partner with Next Door to promote freedom from fear and violence for all women and their families.

Education Department to Delay New Civil Rights Data Survey Questions AAUW Washington Update

The U.S. Department of Education has delayed a significant expansion of its civil-rights data collection that asked more questions about students' civil rights, such as whether schools have Title IX coordinators and how many students were bullied because of their sexual orientation. Questions about discipline and other issues were to be added starting in the 2013-14 school year. Now that information will not be required until the 2015-16 school year. This data collection will provide a critical perspective on the bullying and harassment that students too often endure on the basis of race, sex, and disability. AAUW has been calling for this data to be collected for several years and expressed disappointment that the requirement is being delayed.


Gifts For Teens

This can leave the victim with nothing to wear home, or worse, deciding to withhold their clothing as evidence. The mission of the Grateful Garment Project is to ensure that every victim of a sexual crime goes home with proper clothing and is provided with items they require to reduce further trauma. Scientific Research Shows Volunteering Promotes Health and Happiness

"Human beings appear to be genetically engineered to be happiest and healthiest when we spend a lot of time selflessly helping others—and unhealthy when we're mostly devoted to self-gratification," according to a University of North Carolina study (*The Week* September 13, 2013). The genes of the individuals who experienced happiness based primarily on hedonistic pleasures were found to be priming cells to express high levels of inflammation linked to cancer, diabetes, and cardiovascular disease. The individuals who emphasized service to others showed a pattern of gene expression linked to stronger immunity.

A longitudinal study that tracked volunteering and well-being over many years in thousands of people showed a causal effect: When a person increased volunteer work, all measures of happiness and well-being increased (J. Haidt, The Happiness Hypothesis, 2006). It is equally true that people really enjoy eating, especially in the company of others (Haidt). Do you see where I'm going with this? AAUW-San Jose gives us countless opportunities for meaningful service to others AND delicious snacks at almost every meeting. Want a long, happy and healthy life? And lots of good eats, too?
