Program Development Committee Promotes Branch's Strategic Plan Janice Robbins

As programs were discussed and developed this year, goals of the Strategic Plan (SP) and the AAUW Mission were part of the planning process. Most recently, "The Valley of Heart's Delight" event at Cooper Vino addressed SP Goals 1-3: becoming more visible and active in the community; consistent growth in the size, retention and diversity of our membership; and, advancing the AAUW Mission and the Branch vision. We partnered with local valley businesses (honey, chocolate/caramels, wine, cheese and dried fruit) to raise funds for LAF and AAUW Funds.

The November program regarding Human Trafficking included education and outreach to key local agencies to promote a "focus on education, equity, and positive societal change for women and girls" per the San Jose Branch Vision. This event also addressed SP Goals 1 and 3.

On May 21, we will offer a program that will look at "Muslim Women in America - Beyond the Stereotype." Zahra Billoo from the Council on American-Islamic Relations (C.A.I.R.) and Maha Elgenaidi from Islamic Network Groups (ING) will discuss this topic and share their views with our community. SP Goals 1, 2 and 3 will be addressed, as they are at Fall Event and at the Strong Girls, Strong Women conference.

Barriers and Bias: The Status of Women in Leadership

AAUW's Latest Research Report


Women have been leaders throughout history, and today the tradition of volunteer female leadership continues to flourish. Yet in terms of paid leadership, women's elevation to top positions is relatively rare. Women make up about 50 percent of the U.S. workforce but only 4 percent of chief executive officers at Standard & Poor's 500 index companies, 19 percent of S&P 500 board seats, and only about 26 percent of college and university presidents. In politics, women represent 19 percent of the U.S. Congress and a smaller fraction of governors. These numbers beg the question, Why do men still vastly outnumber women in leadership positions? AAUW's newest research report, "Barriers and Bias: The Status of Women in Leadership," explores this question, drawing from scholarly research and paying special attention to stereotypes and bias. The report provides recommendations for individuals and those in the education, corporate, and political sectors to contribute to an environment in which gender is no longer a barrier to leadership. Women's History Month Working to Form a More Perfect Union: Honoring Women in Public Service and Government

March is Women's History Month and the 2016 theme announced by the <u>National Women's History Project</u> is "Working to Form a More Perfect Union: Honoring Women in Public Service and Government." For many Americans, women's history begins and ends with the Susan B. Anthonys and Elizabeth Cady Stantons of the suffrage movement. While these ladies are important historical figures worthy of recognition, there are countless others who have shaped our world. Who has influenced you? In AAUW, Eleanor Roosevelt is a standout in our celebration of women who dedicate their lives to public service and social justice.

Historically and currently, women are engaging themselves in our endeavor to make our nation more equitable for women and girls despite the challenges facing them: gender discrimination and other barriers to education or opportunities. Side by side, AAUW members and women in public service and government (and their numbers are growing) advance and promote equity in economics, education, voters' rights, health and reproductive rights. Applications Available for Local Scholarships Thea Jacobs, Local Scholarship

Do you know a woman who will be a junior or senior in college during the 2016-17 school year? Please encourage her to check out the criteria for applying for a Local Scholarship. Applications for Local Scholarships will be on our website starting March 1. The deadline for applying is April 15. Applicants need to be enrolled as juniors or seniors in a four-year institution fall quarter or semester 2016, have a minimum GPA of 3.00, and a permanent home address in San Jose, Milpitas, Santa Clara or Campbell. Information for prospective recipients will be sent to community colleges, Santa Clara University and San Jose State.

After applications are received, they are screened by a subset of the Local Scholarship Committee. Those selected are then interviewed by another committee group. We anticipate announcing the recipients of the scholarships in mid- May, awarding a total of about \$45,000.

Have a Problem at Headquarters? Building and Properties (B&P) Can Help! Laura Manthey, Building & Properties

Did the power go out? Did the furnace stop working? Did you notice that a faucet is dripping or a light bulb is out? Emergency (such as a fire)? Call 911!

Non-emergency, but needs attention promptly? Do not attempt to fix it! Contact a B&P member for urgent issues. Find the list of B&P members on the hall bulletin board. Call a maintenance person. If one cannot be reached, contact the Chair. If she cannot be reached, call or email any other member of the committee. Leave a brief message if you cannot speak to a person.

Once you have alerted a committee member to the problem, leave a note on the report form that is on the refrigerator, listing the date, problem, who was contacted, and your name. This way others using Headquarters will know the issue is being addressed.

If it is a non-urgent maintenance issue, you don't need to call. Just leave a note on the report form on the refrigerator. B&P members will check the list when they are at Headquarters and make every attempt to remedy the situation as quickly as possible. Again, this will alert others that the problem has been reported.
