Tech Trek Camp

It was another fun and educational week at Tech Trek this summer. Thanks to the generous contributions from Branch members, we were able to send nine girls to Tech Trek at Stanford University for a one-week STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) camp. In the spring, we interviewed seventeen 7th grade girls from five different schools in San Jose. Each of these candidates was chosen by her math and science teachers for her interest and aptitude in STEM subjects. After the interviews, we selected nine to attend camp. The girls who were selected were thrilled to learn that they would be going to Stanford, getting a taste of college life by staying in the dorms and getting hands-on experience in various topics in science, technology, engineering and math.

Here are a few quotes from our campers:

- \*This has opened my eyes to many new and different careers that I had never heard of before.
- \*During the time that I've spent at this camp with my fellow campers, I have become a more independent and confident girl.
- \*Being here at Tech Trek was one of the best experiences I have had.
- \*I never knew that there were so many things that I can do as a woman to change the world.

### Gifts for Teens—Did You Know? Jan Giroux, Gifts for Teens



Gifts for Teens, as a Community Action Project, works year-round to provide holiday gift bags to homeless and needy South Bay teens. But did you know the outreach this project has within our community and agencies serving this population? Our holiday gift bags also serve as an incentive for teens to visit one of the five agencies we serve to access counseling, health care, housing help, job training and complete educational goals.

In 2017, 1,285 gift bags were distributed to 655 teens living in inner city areas served by Sacred Heart Community Service, and 4,441 homeless teens and youths in group homes were served by the Bill Wilson Center. In addition, 102 Unity Care Group clients from seven downtown group homes and two low-income apartment complexes were aided: 25 homeless teens served by Home First, 49 Advent Group (two homes for male teens and a training program for older youths), and 13 individuals from three poor families were served as well.

This outreach could not be done without the community's help. Gifts for Teens' sixteen-member all-volunteer committee has been generously aided by AAUW San Jose members, local industry, the tech community, philanthropic groups and the community at large. Last year, 383 volunteers worked during our gift bag assembly, 148 donors contributed \$86,267, and 110 donors gave personal items such as cosmetics, games, scarves, and store gift cards. Teens helping needy teens spearheaded donation drives at many high schools.

### Take Action – AAUW Opposes Brett Kavanaugh

AAUW has taken a position opposing the confirmation of Judge Brett Kavanaugh to the Supreme Court.

Available records show that Judge Kavanaugh will not stand up for the health, education, and economic security of women and girls. The Supreme Court is arbiter of many of the rights essential to women and girls, and if confirmed Judge Kavanaugh could cause grave harm to issues that are central to the AAUW mission for decades to come.

Please take action today to let your senators know that you expect their leadership in opposing the confirmation of Brett Kavanaugh. #### Make Your Voice Heard - AAUW San Jose Postcard Station

Next time you are at Headquarters, please take time to stop at the "Postcard Station" in the front hall. You'll find blank postcards and instructions for sending a message to one or more of your elected representatives. Drop the postcard in the drop box and we'll stamp and mail it for you.

Messages to representatives are tallied and used to set policy, to validate positions, to report to the media and to advocate with other elected officials. Your message can be very short. Just state what you want them to Support or Oppose. Sign with your name and zip code.

Make a habit of writing at least one postcard each time you are at Headquarters. We encourage you to take the habit home and continue to act regularly. Don't like to write postcards? Electronic messages and social media can also be used to act. If you are unsure how to use electronic media, contact the <a href="Public Policy Committee">Public Policy Committee</a> and a member will coach you into action.

# Dinner and Voting Anna Fox, Public Policy Committee Wednesday, October 18, 6:30 pm



Our October Third Wednesday program is "Dinner and Voting" and will take place on Wednesday, October 18 with dinner served at 6:30 pm and the program beginning around 7 pm.

A healthy democracy is important. Voting is critical. Political tension in our country is high. It's discouraging to hear people don't vote because they are too busy, it's too complicated, they feel uninformed, they think everything is rigged, they think their vote won't make a difference, etc.

How do you currently vote? Maybe like my husband and I? We sit down at our computers and walk ourselves through the ballot.

Before the June elections, I wondered, how can we make voting more fun? Yes, FUN.

So we invited another couple to join us, and we first shared dinner and then we voted together. We used our laptops, phones, snail mail flyers, etc. and we tackled each candidate and ballot measure together. We researched beforehand, or on our laptops and phones during the process, we checked our sources, we each spoke about issues most important to us, etc. The evening left us more informed and feeling better about our participation in the election!

Our Public Policy group would also like to take the sting out of voting and see if we can be both serious and have fun (with voting)! Therefore, you are invited to Headquarters on Wednesday, October 18 from 6:30 pm to about 8:30 pm, where we will provide dinner and then we can all sit-down to go over each candidate and ballot measure together.

#### Here are the simple ground rules and steps for participation.

- RSVP to me, Anna Fox by Monday, October 15. I will also field any and all questions.
- 2) Sometime during September, confirm that your voter registration is current and accurate --some rare technical glitches have eliminated long-time voters from the rolls.
- 3) Sign up for an absentee ballot ASAP, if you wish. \*Bring your absentee ballot or voter's guide with you to our event!
- 4) Agree on the ground rule that we are doing this to improve the process, NOT tell each other how to vote. Respectful debate is okay, but heavy conflict is not.
- 5) We will have a timekeeper per each item, and work to keep within the allotted time.
- 6) We encourage you to familiarize yourself with what's on the ballot as much as you are able, but don't feel pressured. One of the perks of voting together is that some issues you will feel informed, and others you will learn during the process.
