

2020 Suffrage Celebration Update

Did the 19th Amendment give ALL American women the right to vote?* The language of the 19th Amendment included all eligible voters but not all eligible voters could exercise their right to vote. First of all, the Constitution in 1920 mandated a minimum voting age of 21, so the 19th Amendment allowed for women 21 and over to vote. Then, although the 19th Amendment included women of color, many were unable to vote. In the southern United States, restrictive state or local laws called for poll taxes and/ or literacy tests before a citizen could vote. Eighty percent of African Americans lived in the southern U.S. in 1920. As more African American women moved north, they were able to vote more freely. Full exercise of black voting rights was intended with the Voting Rights Act of 1965; however, even today some states continue to erect barriers to African-American voting. Native American women were largely excluded from voting before the Indian Citizenship Act of 1924; some states and localities still passed laws effectively barring Natives from voting until the late 1940s. Not until the late 1940s and 1950s were restrictions on Asian American voting removed.

Looking at the news today, we are reminded that there still is a fight for participatory democracy. This is why the centennial suffrage recognition in 2020 is so important!

Student Members Provide Testimony in Sacramento

On July 2, our Public Policy Committee, including four student affiliate members from Evergreen Valley College, went to Sacramento to testify in support of SB 47, a bill which would promote voting centers on public college campuses in California. Charina B. Tengson, Alumni President of the EVC affiliate, veteran and single mother of four, was chosen as one of two student speakers to provide brief testimony in support of the bill. She informed the Senate Elections Committee members about the challenges to voting faced by students, especially non-traditional students. Her words were supported in "me too" statements from affiliate members Tiamatha Thomas, Alumni President of the Black Student Union, Van Anh Phan, Alumni President of the LGBTQIA+, and Samar Robleh, Alumni President of Associated Student Government at EVC, along with Susan Karlins, Public Policy Legislative Liaison on behalf of our 300+ Branch members. Afterwards photos were taken with San Jose Assemblyman Ash Kalra, sponsor of the bill.


