Restoring Civil Dialogue Moving from Polarization to Collaboration

Civil dialogue is the ongoing and structured conversation that is generally used by policymakers. It allows for discourse in the communication of thoughts and ideas and requires respect of the other participants. This was the topic of an event held on September 21, "Bringing Back Effective Government," co-sponsored by the Santa Clara County AAUW Interbranch Council and the League of Women Voters.

It was a worthwhile event to attend, and it provided the tools and framework to develop skills while practicing the principles of civil discourse in community discussions. An introductory overview of the process and techniques was presented, then new skills used in a multi-generational discussion of three topics, which included students from Presentation High School. There was a timed section for discussion, and roles included a facilitator, note taker, and participants. Intent was to provide the practice so others may hold civil conversations in their communities for courteous and constructive communication based on mutual respect, fairness, and attentive listening.

Principles taught were from the Kettering Foundation, which focuses on democracy and particularly the role of citizens. Techniques were similar to the STATE method outlined in the book "Crucial Conversations" to resolve conflict when it arises and stay focused on goals to avoid reacting emotionally: Share the facts (not your story or opinion); Tell your story after first stating the facts; Ask for other's paths – let them tell their story or viewpoint; Talk tentatively, remind yourself assumptions are not facts; Encourage testing. Create a safe place by active listening and respect.

Aileen Rizo's Fight for Fair Pay Continues Supported by LAF

Pay equity is a matter of simple fairness. Aileen Rizo, a coordinator at the Fresno County Office of Education, was paid far less than a man in a similar position, despite her greater experience and seniority, because her previous salary was less than his. After trying to remedy the situation with no success, Aileen Rizo eventually filed suit under the Equal Pay Act and California's sex discrimination statutes. Aileen is a Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF) supported plaintiff. AAUW and the LAF have been fighting for Aileen and others by advocating for pay equity and fairness in compensation and benefits. We continue to work for economic self-sufficiency for all women.

Why does the Aileen Rizo case matter? Basing pay on salary history is one factor that can perpetuate the pay gap, precisely because women are typically paid less than men. Many people don't understand the domino effect that pay inequity can have on economic security. Aileen's case sheds light on this important, yet often unrecognized, factor that contributes to the pay gap.

Women who worked full time in 2016 were paid just 80 cents for every dollar paid to men. When the gender pay gap is broken down across different populations, the numbers can become even more stark. This case highlights a significant factor that contributes to the pay gap: relying on an employee's salary history to set new salary levels. Because women are traditionally paid less than men, basing salary on previous history ensures unequal pay will continue.

You can stand with AAUW and take action for fair pay by using the Two Minute Activist button on the AAUW site.




