March 3 California Presidential Primary

The California presidential primary is March 3! Because of the new Voters Choice Act, vote centers will be open up to eleven days before the election, and you will be able to vote in any voting location in Santa Clara County. Everyone will also receive a mail-in ballot automatically, which is a lot more convenient! For more information on changes visit: https://www.sccgov.org/sites/rov/VCA/Pages/home.aspx

Are You Registered as "No Party Preference?" Read This!

If you are a voter registered as No Party Preference, you must request a primary election ballot if you want to vote for a presidential candidate. The American Independent, Democratic, and Libertarian Parties allow No Party Preference voters to participate in their Presidential Primary Elections. However, the Green, Peace and Freedom, and Republican Parties require that you re-register with that specific party.

Your county elections officials are sending you a postcard that allows you to request an American Independent, Democratic, or Libertarian Party ballot. Once you make your selection, return it in the mail. If you do not return this postcard, you will be mailed a ballot without any presidential candidates. If this happens, you can still request a ballot from your county elections official by phone, email or fax:

You can also bring your vote-by-mail ballot to a vote center and exchange it for a Democratic, American Independent or Libertarian ballot that lists those presidential candidates. (Please be aware that the 'American Independent' party is not unaffiliated—you may want to research parties before choosing.)

You can re-register to vote online at <u>registertovote.ca.gov</u>. If you need to re-register after February 18, 2020, you may need to register to vote in person at a polling place, vote center, or your county elections office.

Suffragists or Suffragettes? What's in a suffix?

While American women were fighting for the right to vote, our British sisters were also engaging in an emancipation

battle. Women's suffrage societies began to emerge in Britain in the mid-19th century. Those involved in the first wave of the campaign are known as "suffragists." They believed in peaceful, constitutional campaign methods. In the early twentieth century, after the suffragists failed to make significant progress, a new generation of activists emerged.

A British journalist coined the label "these women suffragettes" to mock and diminish the suffragists, who used militant efforts including arson, hunger strikes, destruction of public property and even bombing. Adding the diminutive suffix "-ette" was meant to curtail these women, bring them under control and elevate them to being constitutional Suffrage advocates who relied on non-militant

efforts, including petitioning, lobbying and marches.

Some US publications, threatened by the non-violent power of the 19th Amendment advocates, used the term in reference to American campaigners. Suffragette was considered an offensive, demeaning term meaning "less than" (think kitchenette, dinette, bachelorette). In the early 1900s, American and British publications portrayed suffragettes as

> unladylike and reckless. At the same time, they described suffragists as gentle and innocent, but vulnerable to joining their counterparts. A 1912 issue of *The Boston Daily Globe* depicted the suffragist and suffragette as the two on the left.

Whether it was the US women's victory in 1920 or the British

women's victory in 1928, the path for women to achieve the vote was long and hard on both sides of the Atlantic. Emancipation foes used name-calling and negative branding out of fear of the women's vote. Let's make sure that whatever they call us, or however they want to control us, WE VOTE!

Kelly Duangrudeeswat is a first-time Local Scholarship recipient and a computer scientist, who will graduate from Mission College with an Associate Degree in Natural Sciences and Mathematics. Kelly will transfer to California State University - Long Beach to major in Computer Science. She is in her third consecutive year on the Dean's List. As the first person in her family to attend college, being on the Dean's List was an important milestone for her.

A few days after graduation from Mission College, Kelly flew to Washington DC where she spent the next three months interning at the National Science Foundation (NSF). At NSF, she had her first experience working in the public sector and she felt a sense of gratitude knowing her work could affect the nation. She worked on two teams, fulfilling the roles of a business analyst on an IT Support team and as NSF's first LaTex Developer. As a business analyst, she supported help desk tickets for the reimbursing system that serves approximately 20,000 reviewers annually. In addition, she observed and learned how teams use the Agile software development methodology to ensure deadlines are met, how to create a network, and met intelligent, kind people.

Kelly is also a member of the Society of Women Engineers (SWE), Women in Computing club (WIC), and a member of the propulsion subsystem Avionics Beach Launch Team, where the team is currently building a rocket with hopes to be the first college-based team to launch a rocket into space. Kelly also advocates for gender diversity, or building rockets, and she works in an organic chemistry lab researching a ligand combination for use in cancer treatment. She practices mindfulness and Muay Thai kickboxing and hopes to work as a researcher. Kelly will succeed at whatever goal she sets for herself!

Fran Sneed held many positions within our Branch, including being President from 1977 to 1978. She was active in a number of local interest groups, primarily book discussions. She was an avid reader and always had wonderful comments on any topic. They did not have a TV in their home, but well-read books were always everywhere.

Fran was active in several Branch study groups, including Redefining Goals in Education, which was a national AAUW topic. Other branches were constantly calling for ideas on how to proceed. One result of the group was a speakers' bureau (made up of members of the study group) that set out to inform PTAs and other groups on how to defeat the Watson Initiative, which was setup to modify school funding.

Fran had two daughters, and for many years she sewed most of their clothes. She started a Branch interest group that lasted one year for those of us who sewed for our children. We had a pattern exchange and discussed the latest ideas on sewing for children.

Her husband, Bob, died several years ago. Their two daughters had successful careers and families. She moved fairly recently into a retirement home. Fran was a dear friend and will be sorely missed. A service in Fran's memory will be held at Campbell United Methodist Church, 1675 S. Winchester Boulevard, on Saturday, February 15 at 2 pm.
