Keeping Our Members Safe at Headquarters

At this point, regardless of vaccination status, all persons must wear face coverings at all times when indoors except: (1) working in a closed room or office alone or with members of their household; (2) when they are actively performing an activity that cannot be done while wearing a face covering (e.g. actively eating or drinking); and (3) as specifically exempted from use of face coverings under the guidance of CDPH (e.g., to communicate with someone who is hearing impaired or where a face covering poses a safety risk).

NCCWSL San Jose's Leadership Scholarship Recipient (part 1 of 3)

Each May, at the University of Maryland, AAUW has sponsored the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) where over 800 women from the United States meet to learn how to enhance their leadership skills and make changes towards improving their communities. This year, the leadership conference was held virtually. Our Branch sponsored Raquel Garcia, Lauren Chun, Yaneth Gutierrez.

Raquel Garcia graduated from San Jose State University (SJSU) in December 2020 with a major in Public Health and a minor in Chemistry. She is a pre-med student, currently applying to medical schools, who plans to use her public health knowledge to increase health equity and decrease health disparities in underrepresented populations.

As a high school student, she received the National Hispanic Scholar Award, and as a freshman, and later as a junior at SJSU, she earned the Principal Scholar Award for obtaining a 4.0 G.P.A. She earned the SJSU Public Health Department Academic Achievement Award in Spring 2020 and their Excellence in Leadership Award in June 2020 and December 2020. Raquel worked to encourage student involvement on campus as a member of the student government's Committee of Programming and Affairs.

Raquel interned with SCOPE, a Stanford based group, and worked as an accountability director, keeping track of volunteers in a Level I trauma center, while maintaining attention to detail, organization and time management. She co-developed Virtual Companions a national non-profit that fosters virtual relationships between older adults and youths to build community and decrease loneliness during and beyond the pandemic.

The virtual NCCWSL Conference gave Raquel the opportunity to learn more about civic engagement, improving cultural competence and how to improve health care access. Several speakers were designated "women of distinction" and she gained insight from their stories of struggles and perseverance. During the virtual workshops, Raquel met pre-med students and students in STEM programs and she is confident she will carry these connections into her career as a physician.

Sofia Vartanian received a Local Scholarship award in 2020. After successfully completing her academic studies at West Valley College in the spring of 2020 with an AS in Chemistry and an AA in Liberal Arts (Math), she began the transition to her academic journey at UCLA in the fall of 2020. But, as for many of us, the COVID-19 pandemic brought many changes and challenges to her personal, academic and financial situations. She was laid off from her job, lost her grandmother to cancer, and at the same time had to scramble to find housing near UCLA because campus housing could not be guaranteed.

As she settled into her new life as a junior in Biology at UCLA, Sofia earned her certification as a medical scribe in the hopes of getting a new job. When classes began, she joined the Bruins Public Health and UCLA Timmy Global Health clubs. These two clubs helped her to further her knowledge about public health and to serve the community at large. In addition, she began volunteering during the pandemic at the Hollywood Food Coalition to help those who were and are facing food insecurities.

Unfortunately, during the winter of 2021, Sofia and her family were diagnosed with COVID-19. But working as a team and helping each other stay mentally positive while dealing with the virus, she was able to complete her junior year at UCLA. In keeping with her career goals of becoming a medical health professional, she enrolled in summer classes at UCLA and is working on completing her Phlebotomy Certification.

Now entering her senior year at UCLA, Sofia has secured a non-paid internship with a start-up company called Health Care Transformation. As a digital marketing intern, she is able to interact and help improve the healthcare system through improving patient knowledge via asynchronous videos, while minimizing healthcare costs and preventing miscommunication.

Virtual Tech Trek 2021

The fact that university campuses were closed was not going to stop a group of very dedicated, hardworking and amazing AAUW women from holding Tech Trek during the summer of 2021. Tech Trek is a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) camp run by AAUW that is held every summer at university campuses throughout the country. California universities were not allowing summer camps on their campuses due to COVID-19. As a result, a group of determined women banded together and made the seemingly impossible possible. With a pilot program of 40 campers in 2020 under their belt, they created Virtual Tech Trek 2021, a hands-on virtual STEM program open to all AAUW branches in California.

Three one-week camps were held during the summer with over 600 campers from 72 AAUW branches in California. Over 250 adult and junior coaches from 52 branches participated. Junior coaches are high school students who had attended Tech Trek in previous years and are a testament to the success of Tech Trek. They continue to be excited about STEM and were eager and enthused to share their love of STEM with this new crop of middle school girls.

AAUW San Jose sponsored 10 students this year. Five of the students were selected in 2020 and five were selected this year. Three members of our Branch, Peg Carlson-Bowen, Katherine Oven and Karelle Cornwell, volunteered as adult coaches, and Mi Nguyen, a high school student and a 2018 Tech Trek camper sponsored by AAUW San Jose, was a junior coach. It was wonderful to work with Mi at Tech Trek this year and to see what an enthusiastic, intelligent and confident young woman she has become. It's hard to say just how big of a role Tech Trek played in this, but I'd like to think that we made a positive difference in her life. Here is what Mi had to say on the last day of camp: "This week was one of the best weeks of my entire summer!"

There was a robotics class in the morning, in which the students created "Wearable Tech" which involved designing and creating a wearable item (most made hats) and incorporating a blinking LED light and a spinning motor, both of which required computer programming and electrical engineering. There were five inspirational speakers who spoke on Astrophysics, Neuroscience, Engineering, The Future of Food, and Climate Activism, and there were hands-on workshops in the afternoons and optional evening workshops. Yes, it was a very packed week!

Strong Start - September 2021

Santa Clara County (SCC) Office of Education sponsors Strong Start to strengthen SCC early childhood education. AAUW CA priorities advocate for these actions: “adequate and equitable funding for high quality public education for all students, including preschoolers.” As a local advocate among many, the seven SCC AAUW branches have been apprised of the actions being taken by Strong Start for three years. The “American Rescue Plan,” the current federal budget being negotiated, and California’s 2022 budget give strong support to early childhood care and education. It has become obvious during the pandemic of the need for affordable, high-quality care so that first responders and hospital workers could do their job while at the same time facilities were shut down to stem the virus spread.

To make amends, California legislative goals are to provide universal 4 year old Transitional Kindergarten regardless of income, full affordable daycare for working families, and increase the capacity of childcare centers.

The most innovative is the Transitional K program for 4 year olds in regular public schools to be completely available by 2025. Besides (from Census date) getting an accurate count of children ready for the program, facilities at the current schools need to be built to accommodate the classes, after school care for all children needs to increase, enough T-K teachers need to be recruited, and a curriculum needs to be designed for 4 year olds to prepare them for the Kindergarten updated curriculum.
