AAUW was represented by CEO Gloria Blackwell at this year's first ever Juneteenth celebration at the White House. She is also featured in an article in the July 3 issue of *Time Magazine*, speaking to the significant burden student loan debt places on women. The striking down of student debt relief has a disproportionate financial impact on women who frequently start their careers with less pay than their male counterparts. As AAUW members, we were equally concerned to see the Supreme Court strike down Affirmative Action for college admissions, but heartened at the quick response to challenge legacy admissions at top universities. It will be interesting to watch new Harvard President, Claudine Gay, navigate these issues. She is a past AAUW American Fellow recipient.

Legacy Gift Left to San Jose Branch



Dorris Miller (May 22, 1931-July 7, 2021) of Palo Alto recently left AAUW San Jose Branch in her estate as one third recipient, a little more than \$300,000.

She was born in Mesilla Park, NM (a small town now part of Las Cruces). After high school, she attended New Mexico A&M College (now New Mexico State University) at Las Cruces, where she studied Mathematics, graduating in 1953. In college she became a member of Chi Omega sorority, and also met her future husband, John W. Miller (Jack).

Dorris worked at SRI International, from 1962 to 1999, as a Mathematician and Senior Scientific Computer Programmer. She worked in the Communications Laboratory and the Radio Physics Laboratory at SRI. Her work was highly regarded by the engineers for whom she worked.

She and Jack were avid world travelers. She loved music, and had a contagious laugh and a wonderful sense of humor. She always cared about other people, and had many close friends over the years. Dorris is survived by her niece Bronwyn C. Meredith (Ricke), nephew Philip Carmichael, great-nephew Wes Neal (Dawn), and great-niece Kristen Graves (Andy).

At the June board meeting, we established a committee (chaired by Diane Trombetta) to develop a plan for the use(s) of this generous gift.

Public Policy Supports CA Legislation

The AAUW San Jose Public Policy Committee has been busy contacting California legislators in support of state bills advancing our mission of gender equity. Every year, AAUW California puts forward a list of approximately 30 bills they plan to advocate for because these bills align with our public policy priorities. Every year, AAUW San Jose pitches in to ensure that they get passed. Our team has already taken action on 22 of the 36 bills for this year, 17 of which we were able to send in letters communicating our support to the relevant committees. Three bills have already passed - AB 1071, authorizing middle and high schools to provide teen dating violence prevention education; SB 376, providing survivors of human trafficking with the right to a support person and an advocate in court; and AB 467, which clarifies the ability of the sentencing court in a domestic violence or human trafficking case to modify restraining orders. We will continue to take action as needed and monitor the progress of all of the remaining bills. Please consider joining us next year! It's really as simple as reaching out to California legislators to see how we can help support each of these bills.

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

Local Scholarship Provides Scholarships for Deserving College and University Women - Again!

Once again, thanks to the support of AAUW San Jose Branch members, the success of Local Scholarship Committee grant writers, and our annual fundraising campaign, we were able to help support several outstanding university women this year. We were able to award a total of \$126,000 to 22 young women to help them continue their higher education. As we have heard from many of them, this money really helps not only themselves, but their families and their communities as well.

The women who received scholarships this year will be attending 10 different universities, including San Jose State, San Francisco State, Santa Clara University, UC San Diego, UCLA, UC Santa Cruz, UC Berkeley, USF, NYU and George Washington University. Their areas of study are diverse, including biochemistry, biology, the arts, computer science, business administration, corporate accounting and finance, nursing, social work and public health. We have at least one each aspiring doctor, lawyer and veterinarian.

We were able to award the named scholarships - Edie Kerr, Grace O'Leary, Goldberg Family and Brenda Ladewig—to excellent young women. We have a brighter outlook on the future after interviewing these inspiring women. We expect that at least some of them will be at Fall Gathering, where you will have the opportunity to meet them. As you know, the Supreme Court struck down President Biden's plan to forgive some student loans. This decision will affect all college students, but especially young women, women of color and low income women. Our scholarships make such a difference! We hope you will continue to contribute to Local Scholarship so we can continue to influence the world in such a positive way. Thank

Although the Gifts for Teens (GFT) project culminates each year in December, the efforts that ultimately lead to that end take place all year long. This year we will be providing 660 duffel bags for needy low-income, homeless and foster care teenagers; youth who are often overlooked and may not otherwise receive any gifts during the holiday season.

Your help begins when you include a donation to GFT with your annual Branch dues, for which we are very grateful. Those funds are used throughout the year by committee members to purchase the items that fill the duffel bags. During the summer months, many hours are spent preparing them for inclusion in the bags. T-shirts are rolled and tied into compact bundles, flip flops are banded together, jewelry is put into jewelry bags, etc.

On September 23, we will fill hygiene and school supply kits to include in the duffel bags. All shifts are filled because of eager volunteers from The National Charity League and St. Francis High School. PAST LOCAL SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT

Maritza Campos received an AAUW Local Scholarship in spring 2022. Both of her parents are from Jalisco, Mexico, and Maritza is the eldest of two daughters. She is a first generation student and a transfer student from De Anza College.

Currently a rising fourth-year student at UCLA, she expects to graduate in the spring of 2024 with a Bachelor's of Science in Biochemistry and a minor in Chicana/o Studies. Maritza's educational interests are health disparities in Latinx communities and immigrant health, and she plans to become a physician. After graduation, she plans to take a gap year to conduct research, take the MCAT medical school entrance exam, and then apply to medical school. She would prefer to attend medical school in California. She is interested in the PRIME medical programs that UC medical schools offer, as they are five-year programs where she can receive both an MD and a Master's degree, while learning about underserved populations. She plans to specialize in primary care to work with immigrant and uninsured communities.

Maritza's extracurricular activities are many. During her first quarter at UCLA, she interned for the Brain Surgical Undergraduate Society, where she had the opportunity to present and write about "Infant and Maternal Mortality Rates and Infant Care Outcomes Between Different Races" in order to obtain a Medical Inclusivity Certification. She is a Board Member of Latinos and Chicanos for Community Medicine (LCCM), and will be Co-President for the upcoming school year. She is also part of the community college planning committee for "La Lucha Sigue: Inspiring the Next Generation of Leaders in Health," a conference the club hosted. She organized a panel of transfer students, including herself, who shared a little about their journeys as pre-health Latinx transfer students, and hosted a Q&A session. Additionally, she is the Risk and Research Director for the Black and Latinx AIDS Project (BLAIDS), which focuses on sexual health awareness and education. She recently received the Dean's Prize for Excellence in Research and Creativity for her research project on the "Medical History of Female and Non-binary Sexual and Reproductive Health." She also helped teach a course, Biochemical Methods I - Introduction to Protein Science, as a Learning Assistant. For the upcoming fall quarter, Maritza will be studying abroad in Oaxaca, Mexico to learn both about public health and traditional health while shadowing physicians.

In addition to all of these extracurricular activities, Maritza works part-time as a pharmacy technician and immunizer at a local pharmacy. She says she has also been fortunate to volunteer at health fairs in medically underserved areas, such as the U.S.-Mexico border and farmworker communities, for the Latino Student Health Project (LSHP) and COMPAS, a UCLA student organization that focuses on health, education, and language disparities with farm-working communities.

It's hard to imagine that she has any free time, but when she does, she likes to visit new beaches, go hiking, and travel.

more awareness to the club and encourage more students to join. She was previously the president of the Opera Theater Club on campus. I admire the women who are busy building their careers and who are becoming members. While a teacher, I was probably the only member of our Branch involved in making 300 plus LINUS Project quilts. This initiative was to help students who needed to earn community service credits. I liked the opportunities, the food, and the fun.

How would you like to be remembered?

I would like to be remembered as a person who could be counted on to meet her commitments, and support the goals and activities of our organization. Thanks for the caring and the fun in our branch.
