You will be voting on the officers who will lead the Branch for fiscal year 2024-25. We are so fortunate to have an AAUW Fellowship recipient coming to speak with us. Beginning this month, we have the opportunity to vote to change the bylaws of AAUW to better reflect the changes in society and meet the new challenges that we face as an organization dedicated to equality and education for women and girls. It may seem like a major shift, but since its inception in 1881, AAUW has been willing to look carefully at itself and change to better reflect its mission. Among other things, we have changed the degree requirements from advanced degrees in only a few approved subjects to include bachelor's degrees in any subject, then adding associate degrees and including men as members. Like all the other changes, this one will serve to strengthen our membership and our commitment to the mission. Please know that welcoming those without a degree will not change who we are and what we are working toward, nor will the name of the organization change. At the March Board meeting, your Board of Directors voted to support this bylaw change. See pertinent information regarding the bylaws voting below.

AAUW is utilizing *SimplyVoting.com*, an independent, third-party voting system for this year's vote. **April 3** | Voting opens. Look for your encrypted ballot email from Simply Voting, Check your spam folder.

May 15 | Online voting ends at 12 noon ET and results will be announced online.

All members without an email address on file or who have unsubscribed from AAUW National emails will receive a paper ballot by mail.


# AAUW San Jose Annual Meeting April 13, 10 am to noon at AAUW San Jose Headquarters

Please join us on Saturday, April 13, 10 am to noon, at our Annual Meeting. We will vote for your Board of Directors for next year, with Installation of Officers guided by Sharon Bouska. The food will take you for a short (virtual) trip to New York with cheesecake, bagels and all the trimmings.

Our speaker will be AAUW Fellowship recipient Carolyn Zola. Carolyn is a PhD candidate in History at Stanford University, where she studies gender, race, and labor in eighteenth and nineteenth century North America. Her dissertation, "Public Women: Urban Provisioners in Nineteenth Century America," focuses on women who sold food in northeastern port cities between the mid-18th and mid-19th Centuries, to offer a radical rethinking of the seemingly familiar story of American economic and urban transformation. A careful study of these women reveals a potent new narrative about the centrality of women's commercial activities during the rise of American capitalism.

A recipient of Stanford University's Centennial Teaching Assistant Award, Carolyn Zola has received research support from the American Association of University Women, the Library Company of Philadelphia Program in Early American Economy and Society, the Michelle R. Clayman Institute for Gender Research, and the Stanford Humanities Center. Born and raised in the Bay Area, before pursuing her PhD at Stanford she worked in theater, studied at City College of San Francisco, and earned her bachelor's degree in history at UC Berkeley.

## **Public Policy Update**

Forty-two members and friends are writing 1,645 postcards to potential primary election voters in Georgia and Virginia, including one of our AAUW Scholars who is writing with her classmates in the group UCLA Latinxs/Chicanxs for Community Medicine. In February and March, we attended School Board meetings in the Cambrian, San Jose Unified, and Santa Clara Unified School Districts. Wendy Foote, Jean Meyer, Peg Carlson-Bowen and Susan Karlins spoke as former parents in these districts, while the rest of us provided support in our AAUW San Jose t-shirts! Teachers and a Board member at one of the districts gave us hugs and asked us to come back for every meeting. This is a district where Moms for Liberty regularly provide public comment that is distressing to many meeting attendees. If you're interested in speaking (guidance for the two-minute public comment will be provided) at your own District Board meeting, contact publicpolicy@aauwsanjose.org.

In early April, Peg Carlson-Bowen, Vicki Ratner, Candace Roney, and Shelley Powers are planning to participate in AAUW CA's Lobby Days, advocating for AAUW CA priority bills to our Assemblymembers and State Senators. At our March 20 and April 17 Public Policy meetings, we will be introducing our One Person/One Bill project to further support AAUW CA's state legislative efforts. Sometime in April, we'll be having a training session for interested participants as well. Ashley Dargert continues to represent us at AAUW CA Public Policy and will lead One Person/One Bill with Elaine Peterson.

Also in April, we'll be collaborating with the Santa Clara County Office of Education to provide voter registration for 16- and 17-year-old students who will then be able to vote when they turn 18. Join us at a meeting to learn more! An orientation session for new participants is offered at 6:30, prior to our 7 pm meetings.

#### How would you like to be remembered?

I like people and I am extremely impressed by what AAUW people are doing. I'm always impressed by any AAUW program that I attend. I like to support our groups like NHN, and everything I can do to support makes me happy! I would like to be remembered as someone who supported our Interest Groups and to know it made me happy to be involved in good works. It's true that I am not able to go into a bookstore and leave without buying a book — probably a cookbook. I spent my later working years as a teacher for Special Needs Students. I hope I have learned more about kindness.
