You should have received an email from National in January asking for comments regarding a proposed bylaw change coming up for a vote in April. National is proposing a change that would allow open membership (i.e., eliminate the degree requirement) for women (and men) going forward. This issue has been brought up before and was narrowly defeated the last time. The Board at National makes a very clear argument to vote for the change. As an organization, we stand for equity and inclusion. The rights we fight for are for all women, so by not including all voices, we hinder our efforts. Along with this effort, National has also added a "Member Rights and Responsibilities" page on their website. Indeed, it is every member's responsibility to vote on this issue. I was surprised to learn that there is about a 25% turnout for their votes. Voting is easy - online, a click of a button - so please make sure you watch for the email and exercise your duty to vote. Voting on this issue will be open April 3 - May 15. For more information, I strongly encourage you to go to aauw.org and search for "open membership." You will find the wording of the bylaws change, as well as an informative toolkit.

In addition, National also created a Civility Policy to be used when discussing this issue, or really any issue coming up in our future. We sadly live in an era of incivility in politics that spills over into many interactions where people may have a difference of opinion. These policies should be put into practice in every meeting you may attend. They include:

Be empathetic - try to see the other's point of view

Be an active listener - make eye contact and pay attention

Be respectful and not condescending

Be curious and open to learning

Repeat points back to show understanding

Find common ground - we all have much more in common than we have differences

Be patient - reaching common ground needs conversations over time

Good advice for everyone!

Gifts for Teens - Teens Helping Teens Cheryl Markman, Gifts for Teens

Every year, Gifts for Teens (GFT) relies on the help and support of many of our local organizations to accomplish our goal. One of those organizations is National Charity League (NCL), specifically the local Blossom Valley and Almaden Chapters. NCL is "a national multi-generational philanthropic organization of mothers and daughters" whose mission is to foster "the mother-daughter relationship through an ongoing commitment to philanthropy, culture and leadership."

For the past three years, NCL members have helped GFT package and wrap thousands of donated cosmetics in festive holiday paper. They also help GFT fill the gift totes and duffel bags that we distribute annually to needy San Jose teenagers. In January 2024, over 100 members of these local NCL branches held their annual charity gift drive. They collected 255 sports bras, which they bagged and wrapped with a cheery note to the recipients and donated to GFT. This is a significant donation to GFT since the comfortable-to-wear sport bras are seldom donated throughout the year. It is also a very valuable donation, as GFT usually purchases the bras at a significant cost. GFT is thrilled to receive this generous donation and to partner with NCL!

Public Policy/Advocacy Update

AAUW San Jose members participated in the Bay Area Roundtable on Gender-Based Violence and Harassment, sponsored by the Women's Bureau of the US Labor Department and led by our own member Carla Collins. The roundtable also included programs about the AAUW CA School Board Project and the herstory of the AAUW Lobby Corps.

We provided oral and written testimony to the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors in support of a resolution "No Child Marriage, No Exceptions." We also attended the Campbell Union High School District Board meeting and engaged with several area groups working to protect the implementation of Education Code Section 51204.5: requiring Social Science instruction to include the role and contributions of both men and women, members of various races/ethnic groups, lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender Americans, persons with disabilities, and members of other ethnic and cultural groups, to the economic, political, and social development of California and the nation.





Tech Trek Really Needs Your Help!

Last month we announced that AAUW CA has added two new campuses near San Jose for the 2024 Summer Tech Trek camps. The new camps will be at Santa Clara University (SCU) and Cal State University Monterey Bay (CSUMB). For both camps, the following stipulations apply:


The STEM professional speaker needs to be female but does not need to be an AAUW member.
