1.**Family Ties Scholarship** – in honor of family members, female or male, who have advanced gender equity and the AAUW mission.


2. Educators Scholarship – in honor of inspiring female or male teachers we have known, or outstanding teachers educating the next generation of women and girls.

Celebrating Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) Month: Honoring Filipino Heritage and Culture Currents

U-Kool-Ladies and Edna Robison, Keynote speaker

In 1978, President Jimmy Carter proclaimed one week in May to commemorate the arrival of the first Japanese immigrants on May 7, 1843 and the May 10 anniversary of the transcontinental railroad built by mostly Chinese workers. The first celebration occurred in May 1979. On May 7, 1992 President George H.W. Bush changed it to one month and added Pacific Islanders. Annually since then, US presidents have proclaimed May as AAPI month.

To promote representation, inspiration, cultural understanding, empowerment and global perspectives, our presentation will showcase legendary Filipino women and trailblazing American women with Filipino ancestry. From the People's Power movement that propelled Corazon Aquino to become the first female President of the Philippines, to the Nobel Prize 2021 Laureate Maria Ressa, we will deep-dive into how these women's pivotal roles helped shape history, champion social justice, break barriers and leave indelible legacies. We will celebrate the Pacific Islanders' experience through Hawaiian songs rendered by the U-Kool-Ladies, using ukuleles as instruments.

AAUW California's 2024 Legislative Agenda

Public Policy/Advocacy Leadership Team

The AAUW CA Public Policy Committee reviewed 67 bills currently before the California legislature, considering their merits, potential costs, and alignment with our public policy priorities.

Our first signature "A" priority bill, "Health Care Coverage for Rape and Sexual Assault Survivors" (AB 2843), was authored by AAUW California. The bill falls under two of our public policy priorities, "Social and Racial Justice for All Members of Society" and "Economic Security for All Women." It would eliminate cost-sharing and deductibles for any rape survivor seeking medical care following a rape. Insurers will be required to cover the cost of medical care with no co-pay.

Our second "A" priority bill, "Title IX Oversight and Compliance Act" (AB 2326), is also sponsored by AAUW California. This bill falls under our public policy priority "Equal Access to Quality Education for All Students" and champions Title IX enforcement. AB 2326 requires all California public colleges and universities to provide and publicly present an annual report of their compliance with Title IX, a move to hold the systems, and their leaders, more publicly accountable.

Our third "A" priority bill, "Protecting Reproductive Health Clinics" (AB 2099), falls under our public policy priority "Social and Racial Justice for All Members of Society." The bill makes it possible for the District Attorney to file a felony charge for sharing personal information or images of individuals, such as reproductive health care providers or patients, with the intent of causing harm or violence against them if the posting and subsequent action results in bodily injury.

Update on Mary Black Two-Time AAUW Scholarship Recipient Cheryl Markman, Local Scholarship

Mary Black received an AAUW Local Scholarship in 2020 and a second one in 2022. She graduated in May 2023 from California State University, Monterey Bay (CSUMB), with a B.S. in Liberal Studies.

Mary recently started a position at a non-profit rehab facility in the Monterey area. She also plans to be a Special Education substitute aide when she's not working night shifts. Additionally, driven by her love for investing in others as well as herself, Mary attends and serves at a recovery group twice a week. The Christian recovery group functions like an Alcoholics Anonymous group but is open to all addictions and life-controlling issues (co-dependency, alcoholism, food and body image, etc.) She welcomes newcomers and leads the songs there. Once she has finished their program, she will be able to be a sponsor for others, something she is eager to do. As a sponsor, she will likely be leading the open share times, where people talk about how their recovery is progressing. Once she gains sufficient experience, she plans to apply for graduate school, working toward a master's degree in either psychology or counseling. Mary's dream is to have her own practice someday.

Mary notes that she become heavily involved with a local church in Monterey where she leads a college Bible study group. Besides the study, they also plan fun activities such as going to movies and dinners. She also leads worship at the church as one of their singers and recently was featured on a worship cover (a piece of music) produced by her church. She notes that, although she's "not the biggest fan of singing in front of a lot of people," she does enjoy singing.

When not involved in one of her service or church related activities, Mary has delved into her "sourdough journey" learning how to make bread and using the discard to make "really yummy crackers." She's also attempting to start a garden but may move before that can happen.

Mary notes that she is so thankful that AAUW has invested in her future and career goals and wishes us all good health!







How did you discover AAUW San Jose?

After retiring in November 2010, I went looking for a volunteer opportunity. I responded to a request in the San Jose Mercury News, and in December helped assemble bags for Gifts for Teens. I was impressed with the project and the wonderful women running it. I ended up joining their committee.

How long have you been a member of AAUW?

After being encouraged by my friends at Gifts for Teens, I joined in 2015.

What do you like most about being a member of AAUW?

I like the friendships and opportunities. There are so many opportunities to support the Branch and also to help others. I was Membership Treasurer for several years and enjoyed getting to know other members. It's also a great way to make friends.

Is there anything else we can do to improve membership experience?

Encouraging members to recruit friends and coworkers is vital. The Branch works well in reaching out to high school and college students. Having members of varying ages makes the membership experience more interesting.

What would you like members to know about you?

In June 2021, I had a bilateral lung transplant and spent 10 months in the hospital. I'm currently at home working to regain the strength I lost during my hospital stay. It's a marathon!

How would you like to be remembered?

First, that I've been there for my family, and second, that I've helped others. I hope I've made a difference in someone's life. AAUW gives me the opportunity to reach out to others.
