Tech Trek Campers Selected and Gearing Up Cheryl Markman, Tech Trek

Earlier this year, a number of local middle schools were contacted, encouraging them to nominate applicants for a chance to attend one of this summer's Tech Trek camps. When selecting schools, we reach out to schools in which the families may not otherwise have the opportunity to send their children to camp. Although not all schools that are contacted choose to participate, this year, four schools chose to do so. They are, Renaissance Academy at Fischer, Renaissance Academy at Mathson, River Glen and University Preparatory Academy.

Of the 27 girls nominated by their teachers, 16 successfully completed the application. The application included submitting an essay telling us about an area of science, technology, engineering or math (STEM) that they are most interested in and why, and what they have done to further their knowledge in this area. In March, they were interviewed in person by several members of the Tech Trek committee.

Based on the applications and interviews, 11 girls were chosen to attend the camps. We are sending seven to Santa Clara University (Camp Hopper) and four to either CSU Monterey Bay or UC Santa Cruz (Camp Carson). They and their families have been notified of their selection and are currently busy filling out the forms that are required to attend camp.

- Sent over 1,000 postcards to encourage voter registration
- Wrote numerous letters of support for passing legislation
- Sent letters to SCC Board of Supervisors supporting the re-establishment of the Urgent Care OB-GYN clinic at Valley Medical Center
- Attended numerous Board of Education meetings in Santa Clara County to advocate for bias-free education

Local Scholarship Investment Account: Year-End Report

As some of you may remember, in 2020 the Interbranch Special Projects Foundation opened a tax-exempt brokerage account at Fidelity Investments for the benefit of our Local Scholarship Community Action Project (LS CAP). This Local Scholarship Investment Account (LSIA) has received your tax-free gifts of stock and cash over the last four years. Donations have been invested in two mutual funds, one a total-market index fund, and the other an index fund screened for sustainable environmental, social, and governance practices. Thanks to your generosity, a healthy economy, and conservative money management, a few thousand dollars has grown to over \$131,000! These funds are a cushion against "lean" years when donations may drop, and it will allow us to give more and larger awards over time.

The LSIA has also allowed us to expand the scope of support we can offer to students in special situations. This year, for example, we were able to pay the transportation costs and exam fees for one of our graduates, enabling her to take the Medical College Admission Test and enter medical school. Thank you, generous members, for keeping our LS CAP alive and well!

Public Policy/Advocacy Update

The pro-censorship group, Moms for Liberty, is gearing up to lobby school boards in response to the recently released Title IX Guidance from the Department of Education. Thirteen of our members are writing letters of support for 29 bills on AAUW California's legislative agenda this year. This is far greater participation than in past years! Spotlight on Christine Hawkins Ruth Dusan and Grace O'Leary

Grace was delighted to visit with Chris Hawkins as she prepared answers for her Spotlight. We thank you, Grace, for securing this interview with Chris. It's also delightful to read.



How did you discover AAUW San Jose?

I was originally a member of the Simi Valley Branch for a few years. In 1985, I moved to San Jose to work for San Jose Unified. At the elementary school where I worked, there was a car that had the AAUW license plate frame. The car belonged to long-time member Nancy Hooton. She introduced me to Branch members, activities and Headquarters. We both have been members of the Wednesday night book club for years.

How long have you been a member of AAUW?

Between Simi and San Jose, I have been a member for over 35 years.

What do you like most about being a member of AAUW?

Where do I begin! I enjoy meeting and talking to members. I admire the many issues the organization deals with in relation to equity and how they have expanded to include other issues. I also enjoy all of the groups you can join and how we are kept up on national issues. There is something for everyone. Also, the workshops and seminars on leadership skills.

Is there anything else we can do to improve membership experience?

I noticed in the BONFIRE they were going to start having members help new members. There are so many organizations you can join today as compared to 30 years ago. But even then and now, AAUW provides opportunities for members for leadership, political issues, projects and friendship. I like the idea of members being there for new members. It gives the new members a closer look of what the Branch is like and a new friend to answer any questions.

What would you like members to know about you?

I was a special education teacher for over 36 years, both public and private schools. I was very active in AAUW for several years and believe the experiences have helped with the leadership positions I held. I received a lot of mentoring from past presidents, enabling me to take on some issues both at school and AAUW that I would not have been able to do alone. I am proud of the women's history project the Branch worked on with Virginia Beck at the San Jose Historical Museum. I enjoy being retired, reading and working on genealogy. I was elected President of the Branch in 1993, and knowing I would serve until 1994 made the summer very busy. I learned a lot about managing my responsibilities and continuing to be an admired and respected teacher with a challenging position. My AAUW experiences were very helpful to me then, and when I took on the history project, which was school-wide in San Jose fourth grades.



Spotlight on Sonia Wright Ruth Dusan and Grace O'Leary

How did you discover AAUW San Jose?

A co-worker recommended I join the group that his wife belonged to (AAUW). I knew nothing about it, but he arranged for me to meet his wife and attend a branch meeting. This is the fourth branch I've belonged to. I have immediately sought out the local branch wherever we have lived

How long have you been a member of AAUW?

After going to two of the branch meetings with Jack's wife Barbara, I joined the branch and got involved. That was 1985, when I was 26 years old. I was the youngest member and all of the members in the Roseburg Oregon branch were over 50. My first branch meeting I sat up front between two 90-year-olds and they both fell asleep during the program. I was asked to take notes at the meeting because the secretary didn't show up. I had to go to the second meeting because I had to present the minutes. I was so impressed with the passion of these women, that I just had to join. I set a goal to get more people my age to join. Over a five-year time span, half the branch were 30-year olds. However, the older members became my best friends, going to state conventions, skiing club, putting on a state convention, fundraising for AAUW, and doing an AAUW grant funded community action project.

What do you like most about being a member of AAUW?

The shared mission. As an old boss of mine used to say when he saw people in suits like him, "These are my people," he would declare. I enjoy the camaraderie and friendships I've made through the four branches I've belonged to.

Is there anything else we can do to improve membership experience?

Good question. Not for me, but I wonder what we need to do to keep younger members engaged like I was engaged as a young person.

What would you like members to know about you?

My first career was in public relations. I swore I would never be in education because my parents were teachers. Within five years of graduating from college, I was working at a community college. My mom said, "I thought you said you'd never be in education." My reply was, "I'm working for a college, but my career is public relations." I got to eat my words 10 years later, when I taught journalism part-time while still doing the PR Director job. Over those 20 years, I was involved in AAUW to learn leadership skills and learned fundraising by serving on the United Way leadership team. I started my second career 19 years ago, when we moved to California for my new career as a Foundation Executive Director at Napa Valley College. Then I was at College of the Siskyous in a similar capacity, and then came to San Jose State University ten years ago as a major gift officer, where I have met all kinds of interesting people. My husband Joe is retired, and his official job is taking care of me -- I don't do laundry, clean the house, grocery shop or cook (only occasionally do I cook). I don't sit still well, so in addition to AAUW activities, I'm a stained glass and fused glass artist. I make jewelry from my fused glass pieces. Additionally, I do paper crafts, making cards and origami. I enjoy walking, swimming and traveling to learn about new places.

How would you like to be remembered?

As someone who made a difference and improved the world in some small way.
