- Maintain a database of contacts within local community organizations, including deadlines and procedures for submitting information.
- Seek potential collaborations that promote the AAUW mission.

Local Scholarship Once Again Provides Scholarships to Deserving College and University Women Cheryl Markman, Local Scholarship Committee

Thanks to the support of AAUW San Jose Branch members and our annual fundraising campaign, Local Scholarship was once again able to help support several outstanding university women. This year we were able to award a total of \$152,500 to 19 amazing young women to help them pursue their higher education. Eight of the 19 women selected were second year recipients.

Among the awards were six Named Scholarships, including the Edie Kerr Scholarship for \$11,000. The remaining Named Scholarships were the Grace O'Leary, Goldberg Family, Brenda Ladewig, Trombetta Family and Dorris Miller Scholarships for \$10,000 each. Additional awards ranged from \$3,000 to \$10,000 each, with two of the smaller amounts being for the final semester before graduation.

The women who received scholarships this year will be attending nine different universities, including San Jose State University, UC Berkeley, Santa Clara University, University of San Francisco, UC Davis, UC Santa Barbara, University of Southern California, George Washington University and University of Oregon. Their diverse areas of study include majors in Nursing, Psych, Psych/Pre-Med, BFA Graphic Design, Graphic Design, Studio Arts, Sociology, Public Health, Film and Media, Advertising, International Affairs, Chemistry, Biochemistry, English, Architecture and Business Administration.

We have a bright outlook on the future after interviewing these inspiring women. We expect that at least some of them will be at Fall Gathering, where you will have the opportunity to meet them.

Our scholarships do make a difference! Over \$10,000 in new donations came with membership renewals. We hope you will continue to contribute to Local Scholarship so we can continue to influence the world in such a positive way. ank you again for your support.

Survey Results Are In! Linda Goldberg

This Spring we conducted a survey of our entire membership and collected feedback on the Branch's communication channels (BONFIRE, emails, social media), Branch programs, and member satisfaction generally. The response was amazing – over 55%!

Data from the 23-question survey has been carefully examined and analyzed. Here are just a few highlights:

- Most respondents value Branch leadership and dedication; enjoy Branch programs, particularly Interest Group activities and are very content with CAP activities.
- Nearly all respondents value the newsletter, and many are also interested in modifications to make it easier to read/use.
- Most respondents appear to be comfortable with about one Branch email per week.
- Many respondents would like to see an increased presence especially on social media channels of Facebook/Instagram.

Spotlight on Linda Goldberg Ruth Dusan and Grace O'Leary

How did you discover AAUW San Jose?

I've been a member of other AAUW branches for a number of years, so when we moved to this area in 2005, I set out to look for a local branch. I'm not quite sure why I found San Jose versus Los Gatos, which might have been closer, but I think San Jose seemed like it obviously was bigger — and it had more things going on. So I sort of sought it out, I guess.

How long have you been a member of AAUW?

I think I joined in 1987 or 1988, so right around in that timeframe.

What do you like most about being a member of AAUW?

I think the thing that I like the most is that it reflects my values, things that are important to me as far as education, as far as promoting women's rights — all of those sorts of things. As well as just improving myself, improving my education and things that I know about, just from interacting with other members. I just enjoy the people — pretty much that's the most enjoyable part.

Is there anything else we can do to improve membership experience?

Not for me — I just feel I certainly can get out of it whatever I need or want. I'm not active in a lot of the groups but I know they are there, so at anytime when I feel that I have time, I know that they will be there for me. So basically no, there is nothing to do to improve.

What would you like members to know about you?

I guess just that I've been a member for so many years, that I joined originally as a stay-at-home mom — when my three kids were young and it seemed that I wanted to talk about something besides kids. So that was my original impetus for joining. And it has proven to be just a wonderful opportunity to meet and get to know people. I was in New Jersey for 25 years and then we moved to Southern California, and I joined a branch there. Again, knowing that the people that I was surrounding myself with would be people I would like and enjoy being with. And then when we moved up here — just 5 years down there, we moved up here and joined again. I know that I mentioned this to somebody at that first Board meeting — that I was President of the branch in New Jersey and of the branch in Southern California. And served in various other, almost any, office along the way.

How would you like to be remembered?

I would like to be remembered as someone who championed education for women. And someone who wanted to continue to learn on my own as I got older.

A friend of mine who had just joined AAUW Los Gatos suggested I join AAUW, which I did.

I joined AAUW San Jose in 1992 - 31 years ago as of this writing.

What do you like most about being a member of AAUW?

The interesting conversations on a wide variety of topics of shared experiences I have enjoyed with everyone participating, especially Lunch Bunch. Also, the huge variety of activities and official positions used to run our elite organization of much influence in advocating for empowering girls and women, I have relished.

Is there anything else we can do to improve membership experience?

To me, equity is important as demonstrated in preparing on Equity Day large 3/4 cookies distributed to many places. As an organization, we need to "toot our horn" louder in the media, in education facilities and libraries.

What would you like members to know about you?

I have been involved in many facets of AAUW over the years in leadership capacities, as in preparing the Directory, managing and tracking membership, being on the Building & Properties Committee in reorganizing, cleaning, supplying, and updating our Headquarters.

I helped make a difference being a participant in Neighbors Helping Neighbors, especially in making quilts for traumatized children, preparing for the holidays with teen duffle bags for our older homeless and sheltered children, cooking and serving 120 lunches for the Family Supportive Center, and sorting and packing food for the homeless. As a wandering photographer, I have captured AAUW's many special projects and award presentations. And finally, I am a member of the "Legacy Circle."

How would you like to be remembered?

I would like to be remembered as a visionary with a gift in organizing places and empowering people to higher levels of confidence and performance.
