

Important Voting Information

Public Policy Leadership Team

- Don't miss the opportunity to learn about November California ballot propositions at the Fall Gathering, Saturday, October 5 from 10-noon.
- When voting for school board candidates, be aware that pro-censorship/anti-LGBTQ candidates don't directly announce their views and often use "parental rights" as their cause. If you want to AVOID candidates promoted by Moms for Liberty who oppose AAUW CA's commitment to bias-free education, their list of pro-censorship candidates can be found here: http://momsforlibertysantaclara.com/candidates 2024.php
- Use the LWV's Voting Guide, which uses your actual address so is most helpful in pointing to candidates. Find them at http://vote411.org/ for credible voting information. If you want Republican party recommendations for our County, go to https://vote.svgop.com. For Democratic party recommendations for our County, go to https://sccdp.org/index.php/vote/
- SCC League of Women Voters is sponsoring candidate forums. Find out about them and sign up at https://my.lwv.org/california/southwest-santa-clara-valley (Southwest area) or https://www.lwvsjsc.org/candidate-forums (Central SJ and eastside).
- 72 AAUW SJ members, along with some of our friends & family, wrote 4,255 postcards to encourage voter engagement in the State of Georgia!
- **CA Legislative Update**—Several of our bills are on the Governor's desk, awaiting his signature, as of writing this. These 3 bills have already been signed into law:

AB 1955 will prohibit school districts from requiring staff to notify parents if a student uses a different name or pronouns or identifies as a different gender than what is on their birth certificate.

AB 1790 will strengthen protections against sexual assault and harassment at Cal State (CSU) campuses by requiring two reports from CSU on the status of their implementation of the State Auditor recommendations

AB 2608 will require the California Community Colleges and CSUs and request from University of California educational and preventive information on sexual violence and harassment, including how to recognize if someone is at risk of drug-facilitated sexual assault.



An Update on Julia Ocher Two-Time AAUW Scholarship Recipient Cheryl Markman, Local Scholarship Committee




Julia Ocher received an AAUW Local Scholarship in 2023 and again in 2024.

When she received the first scholarship, she had just applied to the Bachelor of Fine Arts (BFA) program for Graphic Design at San Jose State University (SJSU). As the BFA for Graphic Design takes five years to complete, this program adds a year of schooling, so she will graduate in 2025 rather than in 2024 as she had expected. Noting that only 24 people were accepted into the program her year, she was very nervous and unsure of herself and her abilities. But looking back, Julia says that applying to this program was the best decision she could have made. She has learned so much, made strong connections with her peers and professors, and now has confidence in her own skills that she didn't have before. Julia is very grateful for AAUW and how these scholarships have allowed her to further her education in the design world.

Throughout the program, Julia has learned many forms of graphic design. One of her favorite projects was to create branding for a fictional conference focused on a recent technological advancement. For her hypothetical conference, Julia chose the topic of vertical farming, creating an animated poster (see picture), personalized name tags and a 3D sculpture. Another project she enjoyed was to create a bus stop poster based on a graphic design topic of her choosing. She chose the golden age of illustrated books as her focus. These projects and others have allowed her to explore the limits of her creativity and expand her design skills. The culmination of all her design work will be featured in her class's Senior show. After graduation, Julia plans to look for job opportunities in the graphic design field. Although not totally set on anything just yet, she notes that she would love to work in advertising or poster design.



In her free time, Julia loves to refine her fine art skills by drawing and painting. She has been experimenting with oil painting, a different medium than the acrylic paints she usually uses. She has been creating a series of oil paintings as a gift for her mother, with each painting featuring architecture from a particular country including scenes inspired by Italy, France and Greece. Outside of art, she loves to swim with her friends, attend concerts, and read all of the library books she can "get her hands on!"







An Update on Kimberly Lopez Two-Time AAUW Scholarship Recipient

Kimberly Lopez was awarded the Grace O'Leary Scholarship from AAUW Local Scholarship in spring 2022, and a second scholarship in 2023. A student at San Jose State University (SJSU), she expects to graduate in spring 2025 with a bachelor's degree and subsequently a master's degree, also from SJSU, in Child and Adolescent Development.

Kimberly notes that the second AAUW scholarship helped continue her goal of becoming an elementary school teacher, focusing mainly on 2nd grade. She looks forward to being a role model for her students and future generations. Toward that end, she works with children at an after-school program called "Give Every Child A Chance," which inspires youth to be successful in lifelong learning by providing safe, structured and fun educational activities in elementary schools. Kimberly helps students with their homework and supports them with enrichment activities that align with the Common Core and the Quality Standards for After School Learning (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math (STEAM)) projects, health education, project-based learning, character building, social-emotional learning, art, drama productions and physical education, which help students grow as individuals and in their learning. Kimberly says she is learning so much, is motivated to finish her education and have her own classroom soon. She is lucky to be part of the SJSU Spartan Accelerated Graduate Education (SAGE) program, which allows her to do her undergraduate classes and master's coursework together in the same degree.

How did you discover AAUW San Jose?

encouraged me to join the Board, which I did, as the chair of Legal Advocacy Fund.



How long have you been a member of AAUW?

I joined in 2002.

What do you like most about being a member of AAUW?

AAUW has women who lead other women to do things they didn't think they would ever be taking on.

Is there anything else we can do to improve membership experience? We need to remember that not everyone who joins remains after the first year. There are many community groups, other than AAUW, which they can join to meet their needs. There are knitting groups, craft classes, book clubs and many volunteer community service groups in their neighborhoods, their children's schools, and their place of worship. What we need to do is welcome a new member we see sitting alone and introduce them to others. When they join an Interest Group, pay special attention to them. We can retain members, and even have new members bring their friends, when we provide an encompassing environment for them.

What would you like members to know about you?

When I joined, I had been a critical care nurse with experience in coronary care and intensive care, a telephone advice nurse, a discharge planner for head injury and spinal cord patients and medical, surgical and orthopedic patients. I realized I was from a work environment alien to about 95% of the members and thought I had little to contribute to the "community service committees" and kept myself to the "special interest" groups. However, presidents, former presidents and active members, kept finding me and "discovering" what I had to contribute. Gloria Leonard (President, 2001-2002) recruited me to be a research team member of the Ballot Initiative Report - a report requested by the San Jose City Council. Gerri Madden (President 2013-2014) was the chair of College University Relations and, shortly after I joined that committee in 2015, she encouraged me to be the co-chair with her for two years and later the chair for another 2 years. I learned an array of skills in the four years I was on college campuses. I never thought I would be teaching Start Smart classes, organizing the NCCWSL scholarships in 2019 and 2021, and giving Equal Pay Day presentations at San Jose State University. Grace O'Leary has been a resource person throughout the years when I was stumped with how to get my committee work done.

How would you like to be remembered?

I would like to be known and remembered as a woman who did her best to be a good wife, mother, grandmother, nurse, friend, and community volunteer.
