

# A Brief History of AAUW San Jose Headquarters Archives Committee

Have you ever wondered how the house on 1165 Minnesota Avenue became AAUW San Jose Headquarters?

**1845:** The 1165 Minnesota Avenue property was part of a Mexican land grant.

**1911:** A family purchased the lot and built a house on 1165 Minnesota Avenue.

**1920:** Michael Holt, a retired wheat farmer from Merced, purchased the Minnesota Avenue house for \$7.900.

**1950:** Branch member Edith Jarman bequeathed her San Carlos Street (San Jose) home to the Branch, but her bequest was challenged in court by a family member. In 1958, after the longest trial in San Jose history to date, the house was sold and AAUW San Jose was awarded 45% of the proceeds, over \$50,000.

**1965:** Long-time Branch members Doreen and Calvin Townsend gave the Branch a grant deed of two acres on Herald Avenue. Wanting a more central location, the Branch sold the Herald Avenue lot for \$32,500.

**1968:** After a thorough search, the Branch purchased the house at 1165 Minnesota Avenue for \$40,000 and moved in on September 1. Repairs and remodeling began, and some say that has never stopped!

## **Summary of Repairing the Brain and Spinal Cord Program** Cheryl Markman

The February program was a fascinating talk about brain and spinal cord injuries by Dr. Marco Lee, Professor of Neurosurgery at Stanford University and former Chief of Neurosurgery at Santa Clara Valley Medical Center.

Brain research, which dates back to 1535, shows that male and female brains are actually physiologically different. In general, male brains are larger and dominate in abstract thinking and spatial orientation; while female brains have more left-to-right side neurological connections, making them "superior" in that sense. Beginning in 1919, neurosurgery focused simply on removing the problematic parts; for example, blood clots and aneurysms. Current research is focused more on functional neurosurgery, restoring lost function to damaged areas of the brain or regenerating function by creating new sources of function.

Areas of focus in functional surgery include:

Movement disorders, such as Parkinson's – possible treatments include deep brain stimulation and vibrotactile stimulation

Locked-In Syndrome – loss of control of body movement while cognition and memory are unaffected; with new technology the patient's thoughts can be directly translated into written word images

Stroke and Stem Cell Therapy – stem cell development can be enhanced to replace areas permanently damaged by stroke

Addressing Alzheimer's disease – Dr. Lee noted that it is the most common form of dementia. In 2023, Alzheimer's affected 4.1 million women over the age of 65 out of the 6.7 million sufferers in America. Basic stages of the disease include progressively worsening memory loss, difficulty performing daily tasks and loss of language and motor skills, ultimately resulting in the loss of most cognitive and physical abilities. The recent discovery of the glymphatic system offers a new area of study. "The sewage system of the brain" functions to clear the interstitial fluid of the brain of waste products including beta-amyloid proteins, thought to be associated with dementia. Interestingly, the glymphatic system operates only during sleep. So, get a good night's sleep, eat well and exercise!

# Take Action - Ways to Contact Your Legislators

Even one act helps to make your voice count. Phone calls are weighted the heaviest, but all contacts are counted. Here are different tools to help:

The app and website <u>5 Calls</u> makes it easy to reach out to federal legislators. Call to oppose the abolition of the Department of Education, which will impact enforcement of existing sexual and gender-based violence protections under Title IX. 5 Calls provides a background/status on the issue, identifies your legislators based on your location, and provides a concise script! Leverage others' diligent work to make your task lighter and your voice heard.

Wondering why to bother calling your elected officials? A millennial Congresswoman shares her experiences and explains why it is important: <u>AOC on why call Congress</u>.

Contact legislators, urging them to back efforts to get money flowing to relevant organizations and programs to raise awareness about and prevent sexual assault violence (e.g., Department of Justice, Office of Violence Against Women). Use the text app <a href="Resistbot">Resistbot</a>: text SIGN PNNWWO to 50409. Or sign up via Facebook Messenger (a no-cost option with many options for "publishing" and/or sharing your comments with others) to contact legislators, urging them to back efforts to get money flowing to relevant organizations and programs to raise awareness about and prevent sexual assault violence (e.g., Department of Justice, Office of Violence Against Women).
