
# March Parking Lot Drive Mary Jane Vitkovich Neighbors Helping Neighbors


Free Community Event - Guests Welcome! Ideals Over Ideologies

San José social justice activists and their campaign to free Angela Davis in 1970s Speaker - Michele Bertolone, History/ Humanities Lecturer, San José State University

In 1970, San José leaders were shocked to learn that the trial of Angela Davis had been moved to their quiet town. Locals worried about the cost and disruption. But it was Davis' defense team that had the real problem. Davis is an African American woman, who in the 1960s was a self-declared communist and a leader of the Black Panther Party. Her supporters openly admitted a fair trial was almost impossible in a place where 93% of potential jurors were white. And yet, the

in the end, an all-white jury acquitted Davis on every charge. Join us to find out how and learn more about San José social justice activists during the post World War II period.

# Gifts for Teens - Our Volunteers Are the Best Cheryl Markman, Gifts for Teens

The saying "It takes a village" definitely applies to the Gifts for Teens Project, especially when it comes time to assemble the gift bags. Our volunteers come from multiple segments of our community and are of all age groups. What they have in common is their dedication to helping others and their enthusiasm about making the community a better place to live. Some of our wonderful volunteers are highlighted here.



Six enthusiastic employees from the local Whole Foods store, clad in bright green store logoed tees, helped with the Project's 110 backpacks, sizing and folding t-shirts and later filling these special bags specifically designed for the older foster-care kids. The store sent over 100 high-protein snack bars to add as a fun and tasty treat for the kids.

Members of two philanthropic sororities, Xi Iota Zeta and Delta Theta Tau, helped fill 770 school supply kits with notebooks, pens, calculators, folders and more. Later, eight sorority members returned to pack 436 male duffel bags to bursting. In addition, one of the groups contributed \$1,000 to help offset bag expenses and the other donated twenty \$50 Target gift cards.

The manager of the Almaden Lucky supermarket, Daniel, supplied about 200 plastic milk crates at the last minute when our regular supplier canceled. The bins are key to organizing gift items such as games and toys or thousands of socks. This affable fellow also volunteered for two work shifts on his days off, folding sweatshirts and filling male duffel bags. He also helped us secure 52 bargain sweatshirts for 2025 giving.

Jake, a Pioneer High School senior, gathered a large student work crew to help one afternoon. Most importantly, he organized his friends to hand-write and decorate 800 student affirmation notes given to all the teens we serve. Teen feedback shows how popular and appreciated these cards are, one local teen supporting another!

Again this year, members of the Los Gatos History Club spent several hours preparing and filling bags. One gray-haired man commented that he was impressed by our efficiency and organization and, despite his initial trepidation in volunteering, he "had a ball!"



Many National Charity League moms and teen daughters volunteered on five separate days. They also donated 270 sports bras and many fun, colorful cosmetics. Again, teens supporting teens! Last, but certainly not least, we thank the steadfast AAUW San Jose volunteers and donors who contribute to GFT throughout the year.

One Saturday afternoon, 20 members of the St. Francis High School track and cross-country team, with their energetic coach and teacher, Phil, and his 12 year-old daughter, loaded all the 110 backpacks for the older teens. Their good humor and enthusiasm inspired all of our GFT committee!

Last, but certainly not least, we thank the steadfast AAUW San Jose volunteers and donors who contribute to GFT throughout the year.



# Looking Back and Looking Ahead Report from Communications/PR ad hoc committee

As the Communications/PR ad hoc committee launches its work for 2025, we want to summarize the 2024 major projects, acknowledge the teams whose collaboration made these projects successful, and share the committee's priorities for 2025. In April 2024 then Branch President Linda Goldberg formed the Communication/PR ad hoc committee to partner with Branch leaders to improve internal and external communications. When I assumed the President's role on July 1, 2024, I decided to continue the committee's work. To advise and guide our initiatives, committee volunteers Peg Carson-Bowen, Diane Trombetta and I engaged Michele Bertolone, a proven communications expert with more than 30 years helping nonprofits meet their communication goals.

First the committee focused on an assessment of Branch communication tools and PR channels. This included an all-member survey to hear directly what was working and what could be improved. Then the committee focused on promoting Branch member and community events as well as polishing/creating tools to help us better communicate and to reflect the AAUW brand. In addition, the team assisted the Local Scholarship Project as they raised funds and prepared to promote the scholarships to potential applicants in winter/spring 2025.

# **Summary of Financial Management Program**

The January AAUW Program offered an overview of strategies for good, lifelong financial management. Our presenter, Russell Malley, has been an investor for over 40 years and is currently the treasurer for two investment clubs. He has also been a volunteer for BetterInvesting, a 501(c)(3) educational nonprofit dedicated to investor education, for nearly 30 years. He is currently a consultant for ICLUBcentral which provides accounting and tax software for investment clubs and is an analyst for the SmallCap Informer, an investment newsletter from ICLUBcentral. Russell is also a member of AAUW San Jose.

Russell's talk focused on how to grow your wealth, a topic of interest to most of us! He covered what to know in the early, mid and later years, and there are many similarities. The basic principles include:

Educate yourself - "If you think education is expensive, try ignorance."

**Live within your means** – If your expenses are greater than your income, you have three solutions: reduce expenses, increase income, or do a combination of both.

**Learn to save** – Expect the unexpected.

Invest – Savings rates are not enough to grow your wealth, but invest only what you can afford to lose. Have a long-term outlook (5 years or more) and be comfortable with the risk.

**Start early** – Invest early and take advantage of compounding – "time in the market beats timing the market."

- -Specifics to educate yourself about in the early years include taxes, budgeting, insurance (including long term health care), investing basics (401K, stocks, investment accounts and brokerage plans) and retirement planning.
- -In the mid years you should stay informed of tax changes, invest in tax-advantaged investments (such as Roth IRA's and 529 college funds), manage your retirement and estate plans, pay down current debt and avoid debt for depreciating assets (such as cars).
- -Considerations in the later years include drawing down taxable retirement accounts, knowing the rules for retirement fund distributions, reevaluating your insurance needs (you may no longer need life insurance), reviewing estate distribution (be sure beneficiaries are up to date), reevaluating your investment portfolio (old guidance: have less than 60% in stocks; new guidance: have 70-80% stocks grow faster than savings and bonds).

Russell concluded by mentioning some of the psychological factors involved in financial management, noting that people are not inherently rational about financial matters and that risk tolerance differs between people. Consequently, financial plans will differ from person to person. Lots to think about!

# Free Online Class for AAUW Members: Mindfulness-Based Stress Reduction (MBSR) \$725 Value – now FREE



Kelly Weisberg, Certified Mindfulness Instructor Online class: Fridays, March 7- April 25, 2025, 9:00-11:30am

Stress is everywhere in our modern lives. We often feel overwhelmed by work, family, relationships, and social unrest. Stress leads us to feel anxious and depressed. It contributes to sleeplessness and loss of appetite or overeating.

Mindfulness teaches us techniques for stress management. Mindfulness is the practice of focusing on moment-to-moment experience without self-criticism and with acceptance. Mindfulness helps us mobilize our inner resources to meet the challenges of everyday life.

Mindfulness-Based Stress Reduction (MBSR) is the gold standard in mindfulness classes and is offered worldwide in hospitals, medical centers, and education institutions. It was started by Dr. Jon Kabat-Zinn, at the University of Massachusetts Medical Center to help patients with chronic pain. It rests on scientific evidence that supports its beneficial effects on health and well-being. MBSR programs normally cost from \$395 to \$725, depending on the provider. This class is free to AAUW members (please donate to your local chapter).

I am a certified mindfulness instructor and a lawyer/sociologist who has taught law and human behavior classes for 40 years. The class meets online for 2.5 hours once weekly, for 8 weeks plus a half-day-long online retreat. Participants are guided through formal mindfulness practices, small group discussion and talks, and practices/exercises.
