#### How did you discover AAUW San Jose?

I have made so many friends in our Branch and been exposed to such a wide variety of Interest Groups, Programs, and offices that I know once I retire, life will never be boring. Most importantly, I believe in the mission, so I am proud to be able to say I belong to such an important and worthwhile organization.

Is there anything else we can do to improve membership experience? I have always enjoyed everything I've tried at AAUW, so for me at least nothing needs to change. I don't have any revelations on how to retain members. We know members who are involved from day one are more likely to stay. A New Program for Gifts for Teens

AAUW San Jose has been hard at work promoting AAUW policy priorities. Through August we will be supporting many of the 30 AAUW CA-supported bills in the legislature with phone calls and letters of support. Join one of our Public Policy meetings to learn more!

In April, three of us and an AAUW CA Public Policy Co-Chair and member of our sister Silicon Valley Branch met with an aide to Congressman Liccardo about AAUW policy priorities. Later that weekend, on April 5, a dozen of us rallied in support of our democratic institutions at the Hands Off! protest in St. James Park in San Jose. Six of us participated in AAUW CA Lobby Days promoting AAUW CA's top three priority bills. Karelle Cornwell, Maritza Campos, Peg Carlson-Bowen and Susan Karlins met with Sacramento staff for Assemblymembers Kalra, Ahrens and Caloza.

Elaine Peterson and Candace Roney lobbied Assemblymember Berman's staffer via Zoom.

Meanwhile, 44 of us wrote 1,220 postcards to potential voters of color in Virginia, encouraging them to participate in the upcoming June primary election there.
